For honing entrepreneurial skills, better modes delivery like workshops, seminars relating to entrepreneurship are conducted by departments, besides students are encouraged to put stalls at mega cultural events - "Alpha Fest "," Kalakirithi" in the college campus in the name of Alpha Bazaar. Problem solving skills are addressed through case studies and collaborative learning. College YUVA club encouraged students to participate in intercollegiate competition "INSTAMINDS" which was the platform to bring in the young minds and industry to collaborate and arrive a solutions for industry problems. For fostering leadership skills, college has a supportive and inclusive culture where each department has its own clubs besides common clubs like Rotract, YUVA,Women cell etc. In all these students are nominated for various office bearer roles where they can develop their leadership skills. For communication skills, students are encouraged to participate in debates, essay writing competitions etc. Above all, students pursue skill development course pertaining to their domain under the flagship program "NAAN MUDHALVAN " .

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

Perseveration and Promotion of arts, culture and belief are given utmost priority in Alpha Arts & Science College. In this domain our college celebrated" Pongal festival". The purpose of celebration is to instill in students the value of "gratitude" in order to foster a sense of belonging and community. They wore traditional attire and performed dances with musical instruments like Parai, Thampattam showcasing the rich heritage of Tamil Nadu. College also celebrated "Onam" festival by conducting competition among students in "Floral Rangoli "to showcase the artistic skills and creativity. In the domain of health and wellness college conducted Inter-collegiate competition called "Food without Fire" where millets were given as main ingredient. Department of Commerce conducted a seminar on "Human Wellness- Naturopathy" by inviting Healer K.Vijay Anand. The aim is to create awareness among students about the natural and holistic approach to health and wellness. Department of Bio-technology undertook a project in which students were taught to make Nutribar out of millets. To create awareness about benefits of yoga "Yoga Day" was observed on June 21st 2022.

19.Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

AASC places a strong emphasis on OBE educational philosophy and

ensure the delivery of high-quality education to students by enabling course instructors to adhere to POs, COs framework. Course Instructors are instructed to design instructional strategies, assessment method to cater student's diversity and keep align with learning outcome. College has taken steps to keep the teaching faculties updated on best practices in OBE, educational technology and pedagogical approaches by arranging FDPs at constant intervals. A copy of course curriculum is circulated to students to keep them transparent of what they learn in particular course. To enhance learning experience course instructors use online tools for academic interaction. Both formative and summative assessment is carried to assess the attainment of learning outcomes. Formative assessment encompasses CIA, Model, seminar and assignments whereas summative assessment is done through end- semester university examinations. Feedback is collected from teachers at the end of each semester for the course curriculum and at the end of the year from recruiters for skill gap analysis. The selected alumni at the end of the each academic year are drawn feedback about their market preparedness and the collective evaluation help to ensure corrective measures as a regular practice to ascertain the behavioral outcomes.

20.Distance education/online education:

As an affiliated college, there is less scope to offer open distance learning and online programs. However, each department maintains digital repositories for each course to access learning materials. Also, whenever needed course instructors are handling online classes for which a paid version of G-suite is utilized. The Socioeconomic strata of our students highly demands face-to- face physical class as they need the teacher's guidance to study. Even then, the College strives to bring in a blended learning environment to deepen the teaching and learning. Teachers are using digital technology for engagement activities like submitting assignments, posting course materials etc. Webinars, FDPs, Tech-talks are all conducted in online mode too. For high-performing students college encourages to enroll themselves in MOOCs, SWAYAM courses.

2.2.1 - The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organizes special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

The first year students are eased with a bridge course with a duration of one week for English, Mathematics and technical aspects related to their discipline / domain. Both the underperformers and advanced learners are given right opportunities as per their potential to participate in the competitions, seminars and conferences.

A mentor is attached to every student who helps his/her in improving their overall performance. Periodic PTA conducted also enables us to understand the personal problems faced by the students which disturbs their performance.

Bridge Course - Cambridge Assessment English Proficiency Test - BEC Prelims Certificate Course is conducted by the Department of English.

The other formative assessments ascertain the progress of the learner during the course of a semester. Remedial and Tutorial programmes are executed through scaffolding method where concepts are broken down into manageable units. Different strategies, like peer group learning, videos, mind

maps are employed to ensure students' progress in the remedial program. The ultimate aim of both programmes is to mould students into independent learners with sufficient critical thinking, problem solving and creative skills.

The campus is equipped with Wi-Fi connectivity, and substantial access to e-learning resources is enabled in the library. The College possesses 14 ICT-enabled classrooms for interesting visual presentations of concepts. The teaching and learning through activities in every instructional hour is encouraged. Also tools like padlet, direct polls, quizzee are used to hold the attention

of students and make the teaching more interactive. Lecture notes, assignment and past University question papers are shared through drive with the approval of the Heads of the department. Video lectures through the faculty youtube channels are made available for absentees as well as those students who need additional help. This enables the students to learn after College hours. 2.5 - Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 - Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode. Write description within 200 words.

The management ensures that the internal exams are conducted in a transparent manner. The dates of the CIA and Model exams determined by the college council are published in the academic calendar. Internal assessment process includes assignment, seminar, attendance and internal tests. The internal components are informed to the students in advance. To test the cognitive abilities of the students, at the completion of every unit course instructor gives an assignment and seminar. The completion of the syllabus is verified by the Principal and Vice Principal. Exam cell conducts common CIA at the completion of two and half units and Model examination after the completion of five units. Exam cell sends a circular to departments to submit the question paper pertaining to exams within a stipulated time. Course instructor prepares the question paper which is verified by the Head of the department and the Principal. Exam cell prepares the time table for the examination which is circulated to students through the Heads of the Departments

Examination cell of the college conducts common internal exams like CIA and Model examination for all courses of various programs. The course instructors evaluate the answer script and distribute it to the students within a week. Course instructor records the marks in a log book.
